with young Namibians being particularly affected (46%)

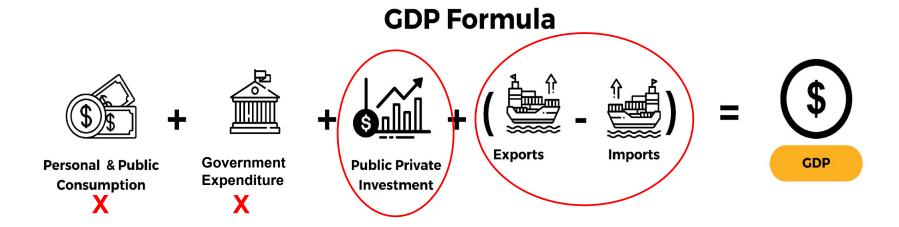


0.576 Gini Coefficient

Namibians are either monetarily or multidimensionally poor, or both.

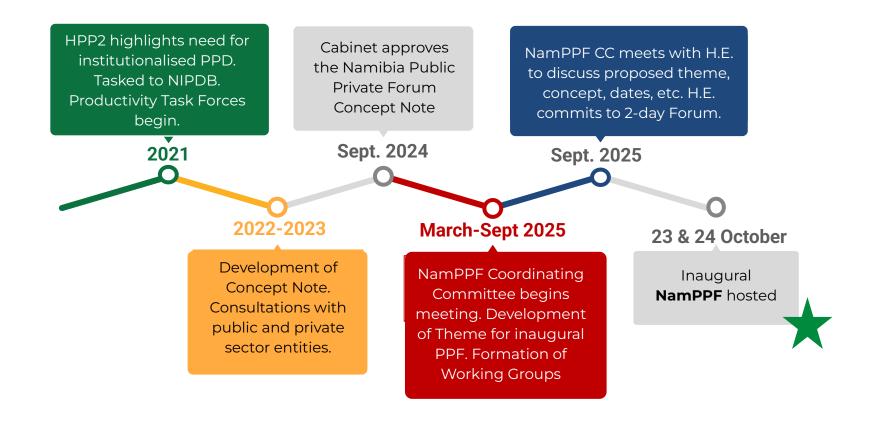




- Competitive economies have consistent, institutionalised public-private dialogue (PPD)
- Namibia has experienced previous instances of impactful, high-quality PPD
- NamPPF seeks to bring institutionalised PPD a fully integrated process, with public and private sector stakeholders who co-create solutions and measure impact year-on-year
- Public-private dialogue boosts private sector growth & employment better regulation, investor confidence, and coordinated reforms lead to firm expansion (World Bank, 2020)

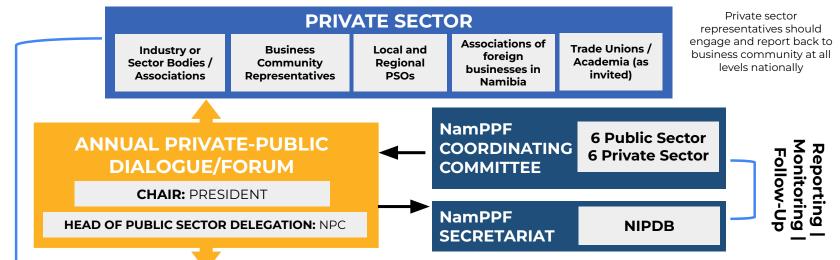

PUBLIC SECTOR

Through relevant offices, ministries and agencies, engage with the view to ensure policies and systems are in place to provide a conducive environment for businesses to thrive. Lead public sector sponsor is National Planning Commission.

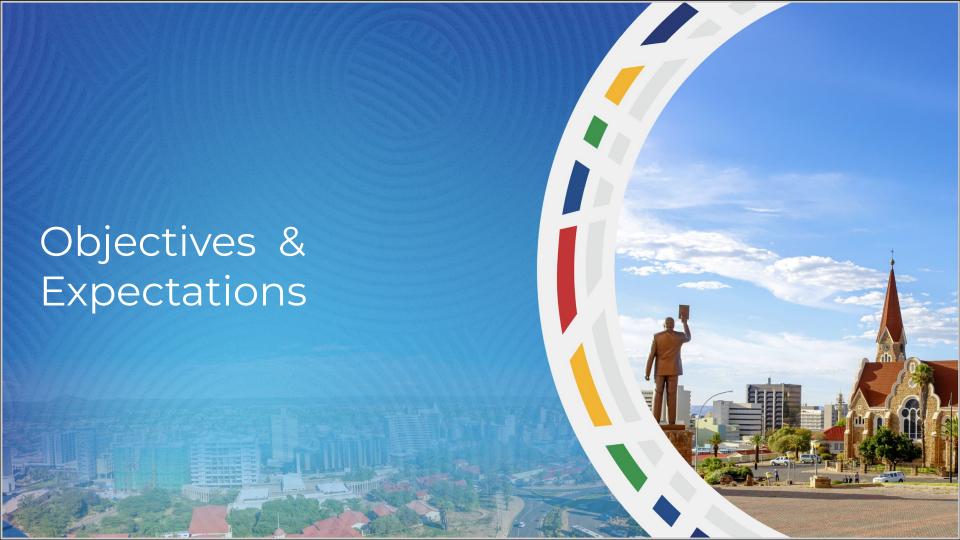














NamPPF 1: Objectives and Expected Outcomes

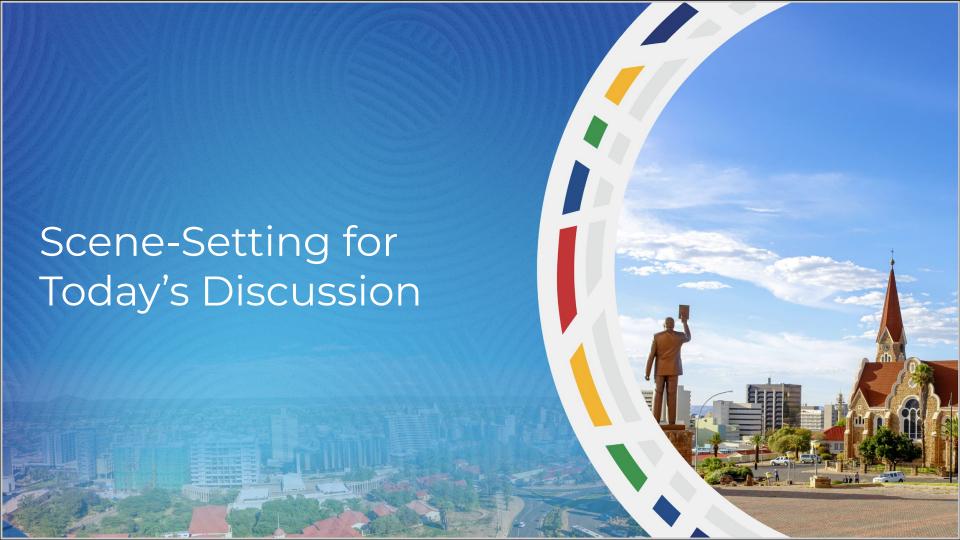
